
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### We are called to be tangible signs of hope

"During the Holy Year, we are called to be tangible signs of hope for those of our brothers and sisters who experience hardships of any kind." — Pope Francis, "Spes non confundit" (Hope does not disappoint)

n "Spes non confundit," introducing the 2025 Jubilee Year, Pope Francis

expresses his desire that it be for us, "A moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus." He also calls us, "To be tangible signs of hope" for those experiencing hardships of any kind, among whom are those living with illness or disabilities. He beautifully calls the care given to them, "a hymn to human dignity, a song of hope that calls for the choral participation of society as a whole."

We do not have to look far to find the need for hope in our families, parishes, and communities. Saint Teresa of Calcutta used to say that "love begins at home" and encouraged serving those closest to us. For some, time is fully spent caring for family, while others may have more time for serving in the community.

Diane Marcoux-Leclair of Most Holy Name of Jesus Parish in Morrisville has a heart for the elderly and saw a need in her community to minister to them. She feels called by God to spend time visiting with residents of a nursing home, which gives her great joy. "The Right to Life," she asserts, "also includes the end

> of life." Recently, a resident whom she visited on a regular basis and who had become dear to her, passed away. Diane was blessed to spend time with her elderly friend the day she died, holding her hand and bringing her hope in the last hours of her life.

Diane also spends time with her own elderly mother and others, saying, "God always sends me someone else." She encour-

ages others to bring hope to the elderly by spending time visiting with them.

We can also bring hope to others through paid work. There are many professions that provide invaluable service to those who need support. In "Spes non confundit," the Holy Father specifically mentions healthcare workers who deserve our gratitude.

In a recent conversation with an American Sign Language interpreter, she mentioned the shortage of interpreters in Vermont, as fewer young people learn this important skill. It occurred to me

how Catholics can live out their faith, serving those living with disabilities, through their career choices.

Providing support for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, either in full- or part-time positions through county agencies, is another area in which Catholics can bring hope to others, and support workers are greatly needed. Paul Cormier, a parishioner of St. Andrew Parish in Waterbury, works as a direct support professional, bringing clients with special needs to their daily activities and appointments, and providing support as needed. Since becoming a father to his son with Down syndrome many years ago, Paul has always felt called to work with individuals with disabilities.

May the Jubilee Year with the message, "Hope does not disappoint," inspire us to look for opportunities for providing hope.

In the words of Pope Francis as he concludes "Spes non confundit," "Let us even now be drawn to this hope! Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it."
